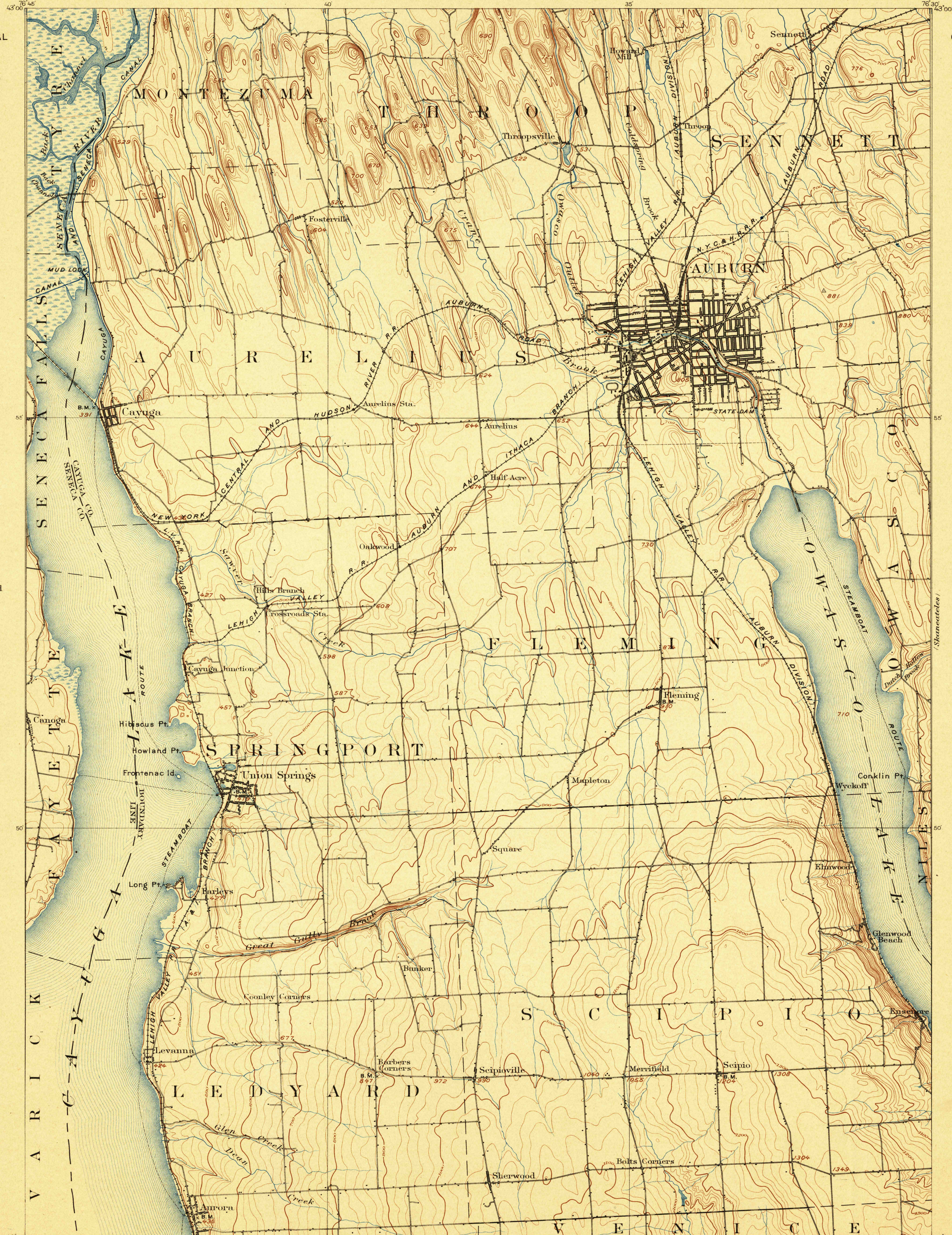

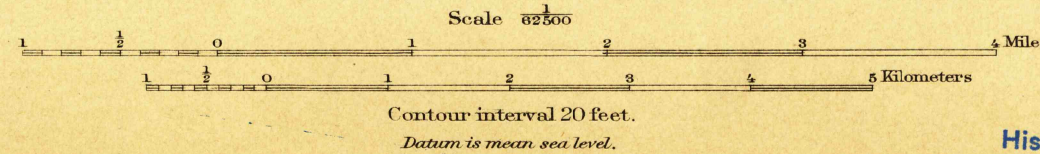
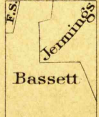
DRAINAGE (printed in blue)
