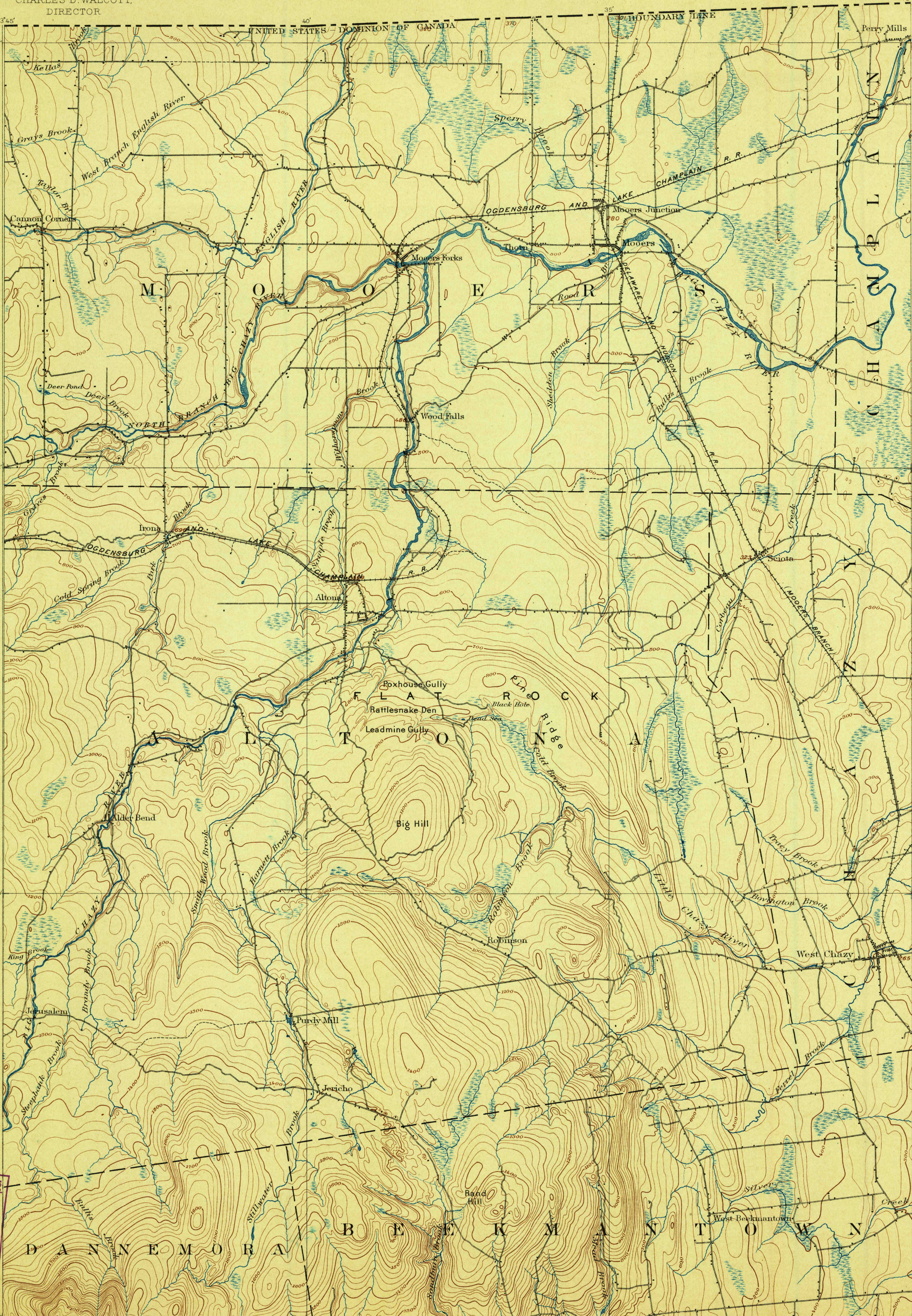

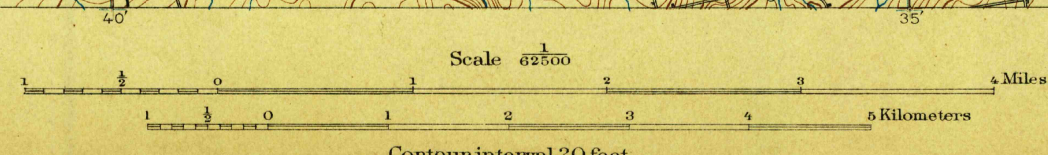
The above signs are in current use on the topographic maps. Variations from this usage appear in some maps of earlier dates.
